2 Months

- Coos, smiles, and makes gurgling sounds
- □ Turns head toward sounds
- Pays attention to faces and recognize people at a distance
- □ Follows movement with eyes and head
- □ Can hold head up and begins to push up when lying on tummy
- □ Moves arms and legs easily

4 Months

- Smiles spontaneously, especially at people
- □ Watches faces closely and copies some movements and facial expressions
- Begins to babble with expression and copies sounds
- Cries in different ways to show hunger, pain, or being tired
- Uses hands and eyes together, such as seeing a toy and reaching for it
- □ Holds head steady, unsupported
- Pushes down on legs when feet are on a hard surface
- □ When lying on stomach, pushes up to elbows and may be able to roll over

Ask your pediatrician for a developmental screening at 9 months

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6 Months

- ☐ Knows familiar faces and begins to know if someone is a stranger
- Likes to play with others, especially parents
- Responds to other people's emotions and often seems happy
- □ Likes to look at self in a mirror
- □ Begins to sit without support
- □ Strings vowels together when babbling
- □ Responds to own name
- □ Shows curiosity about things and tries to get things that are out of reach
- Begins to pass things from one hand to the other
- □ Rolls over in both directions (front to back, back to front)

9 Months

- □ Has favorite toys
- □ Understands "no"
- □ Uses fingers to point at things
- □ Picks up things like cereal o's between thumb and index finger
- □ Stands, holding on
- □ Plays peek-a-boo
- □ Can get into sitting position and sit without support
- Pulls to stand
- Crawls

1 Year

- □ Has favorite things and people
- ☐ Hands you a book when they want to hear a story
- □ Repeats sounds or actions to get attention
- □ Puts out arm or leg to help with dressing
- Plays games such as "peek-a-boo" and "pat-a-cake"
- □ Follows simple directions like "pick up the toy"
- Says "mama" and "dada" and exclamations like "uh-oh!"
- Explores things in different ways, like shaking, banging, throwing
- Starts to use things correctly; for example, drinks from a cup, brushes hair
- Uses simple gestures, like shaking head "no" or waving "bye-bye"
